



### SWITZERLAND SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP CAROLINE BARR

I would highly recommend scholarship to anyone who wants to broaden their horizons and visit other countries, learn more about agriculture abroad and get to know fellow Devon young farmers too!

n the 13th of August 2023, I, along with 13 young farmers from across Devon, gathered to depart on our Senior Travel Scholarship to Switzerland. We had an early start as we got the Falcon at 2am to head to Bristol airport but we were excited and ready to go! The first day consisted of travelling as we faced a delayed flight and then journeyed by train across Switzerland, from Geneva to Zurich then onwards to Flumserburg. Our Swiss hosts, Lukas, Tom and Michael (from Schweizerische Landjugend, the Swiss equivalent of young farmers) met us at the train station and drove us up the mountain to our chalet where we all called it a night as we knew we had an early start.

1,500 chickens, and they had recently completed their new barn, at an expense of 1.2 million!

After a tour of the farm and its facilities, we headed off to have a picnic by a river where we relaxed and some of the guys even went for a quick dip to cool off. We then continued onwards to another farm, this time a dairy and pig farm. They specialised in yoghurt and bircher muesli production, as well as livestreaming their pigs so the customer knows exactly how they are reared. We got to tour the production facilities, nearly losing Luke's flip-flops to the blast freezer and sampling the yoghurts which we all enjoyed immensely.

The next morning we got to take in the spectacular view as we ate breakfast outside our chalet, fuelling up for a busy day! We departed to head to see our first farm of the day and meet the locals, the beautiful Swiss brown cows. The farm consisted of 10 milking cows and



The final farm of the day was an organic turkey farm, which was in fact the only turkey breeding farm in Switzerland! The farm hatches all year round as they don't really eat turkey

at Christmas. We also got to see how the farms cut their grass on the steep terrain, with most of the boys testing out the machinery and Alex even got to give the hay crane a test drive.

We got to meet the locals and see new ways of farm diversification.

The second day was another action-packed day, our hosts told us we were going for a nice walk, which in reality translated to a 4-hour hike in the Alps and going swimming in a very refreshing lake. It was an amazing way to take in the breathtaking scenery, (as well as taking my breath away due to the altitude and my poor fitness level). Thankfully

the way down was a lot quicker as we opted to take the alpine coaster down, pushing my nerves to the limit!

The following day we visited a worldfamous chocolate factory, finding

out how the chocolate was made with a focus on Swiss produce, using local milk and sugar. Afterwards, we journeyed to a restaurant to try some local cuisine for lunch and then spent our afternoon by a lake, sunbathing and swimming. Later that evening we got

a taste for Swiss nightlife as we headed to a nightclub, and got our dance moves out as we learnt to partner dance to hardstyle, a very unexpected but entertaining combination.

On our final day exploring, we visited another two farms. The first was an



educational farm, focused on hosting school children and other groups, to help them understand more about the food chain.

In the afternoon we headed up the mountains to an alpine farm, to see how Swiss cheese is produced. The farm was operated as a cooperative, with a total of 150 animals which are kept in the mountains in the summer, where they make 4 tonnes of cheese and run a restaurant. The highlight of the farm visit though, had to be seeing the cows being brought in across the mountainside, hearing their cowbells ring out as they walked along before

we headed back to the chalet for our final night.

Overall, scholarship was a fantastic opportunity to gain insight into Swiss culture and to see their local agriculture and the way of life. We got to meet the locals, see new ways of diversifying and how they focus on local produce. I would highly recommend scholarship to anyone who wants to broaden their horizons and visit other countries, learn more about agriculture abroad and to get to know their fellow Devon young farmers too!



## SWEDEN JUNIOR SCHOLARSHIP FREYA HARDING

The Junior Scholarship was an amazing experience, especially for me as I have never travelled abroad. We have come back with friends for life.

On the 4th August, 7 junior members and our two amazing leaders Georgie Pengelly and Harry Sprague, started our journey, meeting at Exeter services. We set off at midnight heading for London Heathrow Airport for a 7am flight, which took 4 hours by coach.

We arrived in Denmark at 9:50am, where we ventured to our next mode of transport, taking 2 hours and 27 minutes via train, from Copenhagen

Airport making 3 train switches arriving in Växjö at 12:49pm where the Swedish hosts kindly picked us up from the station.

On arrival, we were greeted by the 4H, an organisation which focuses on personal development and learning through hands on activities. Many of the members share an interest in agriculture but is open to people who don't have that background as well. Just like our community within young farmers.

All week we enjoyed activities with the 4H.We got to know them and their backgrounds and shared music and cultures as we sat together in the evenings.

On our second day, the first full day we went to the 4H farm, where we helped with the farm work and learnt about the purpose for it. The farm buildings itself still has the look and the features from farms 80 years ago. The farm is open to everyone in the community and public as it can educate public to see how their food is made, where it comes from and that it is looked after. They had various types of animals including sheep, pigs, chicken and even rabbits. In the afternoon, we went off for a farm walk on a local dairy farm. The dairy farm was powered by two robots milking the cows. They had Swedish Reds and Holsteins. The farm houses 140 cows and the milk tank held II thousand litres of milk.



On our third day, we went canoeing on the lake nearby, with the majority of us managing to stay on board we paired up with our new friends in the 4H and practised our teamwork.We then visited the city, we travelled by the public bus and went to various shops and explored the city Cathedral which is well known for its stainedglass windows, architecture and wealth. It was built in 12th century and is one of the oldest buildings in Växjö, its dedicated to Saint Sigfrid who is a patron saint of Växjö. The cathedral has a mix of architectural styles including Romanesque and gothic elements. Inside the cathedral, you can find beautiful stained-glass windows and intricate woodwork. It is a tourist attraction and also serves a place of worship for the local community.

On our fourth day, we went tree top climbing and went on a hike in the woodlands after. This was our last day at the Evedals resort.

On the fifth day, on the way to our next accommodation, we visited a moose farm where we fed the animals. We learnt that moose are the largest of all deer animals, the males (wean) weighs 400 to 500kg and the female weighs 300 to 350 kg. For the antlers, you can recognise the males as the females do not have antlers. Each year the males drop their horns, and it takes place between December -February and then new horns begin to grow. When the horns grow, they have 'bastheads' on the horns. In September, the horns have grown completely, and they sweep



off their 'bast' skin. When moose mate, the rut begins in September and the cone Is Pregnant for about 8 months. The calves are usually born in the middle of May. They eat leaves, twigs and grass being the main source of their diet, yet they do tend to eat bark and buds from the trees. We then made our way to the 4H house in Almhult where we spent our last few days before heading back to Devon.

On the sixth day, we went to our last two farm walks, the first farm belonged to a member of the 4H which was a sheep farm, they had a flock of Suffolks. They also have arable land which was 321 acres for forestry purposes. The main way they maintain the trees is by thinning them at 20 to 25 years old, then repeated after 10 to 15 years. This is done as the weather gets colder. Forestry farms in Northern areas need to wait longer as trees are slower to develop due to it being a colder climate.

Our final day was full of travelling, we left Almhult saying goodbye to the 4H and making our way to the train station for 6:52am departure taking I hour and 42 minutes with no changes and will arrive in Copenhagen Airport at



8:34am. We then took the 11:00am departure from Copenhagen Airport and arrived in Heathrow Airport at 12:05pm. We then travelled back to Exeter services by coach which took us to the end of our journey.

Overall, I can confidently say it was an amazing experience for all of us, especially for me as I have never travelled abroad. We have come back with friends for life, and even still in contact with all the members from 4H that we met. Thank you YFC for giving us this opportunity!



# KENYA NFYFC TEAM TRAVEL CHLOE ARSCOTT & ANNELIESE RETALLICK

We have come home having made a difference to the lives of the young children we have helped and the future patients of Haruma hospital.

ur first couple of days in Kenya were spent on an induction in Nanyuki, learning about the Kenyan culture and what our project would entail. Firstly we visited the DEB Primary School, this primary school is in Mongengo which is a slum in Nanyuki, 1000 students attend this school with most of them starting at age 5 and finishing at 15/16. Our second project was at Haruma Hospital where we were given a farm tour, the aim of the farm is to keep the hospital self sufficient food wise. We were shown around the vegetable gardens and then around the livestock, they have 4 dairy cows, broilers, turkeys, pigs, goats and 300 caged laying hens. Before the weekend we had chance to start our project at

the hospital, where we would be planting a field with cabbages, spinach and carrots.

Over the weekend we went on a breathtaking safari at Ol Pejeta Conservancy and saw lions, buffalo, elephants, zebra, giraffes, waterbuck,

black rhino and antelope to name a few. We were also lucky enough to see the last two Northern White Rhino on earth. We also spent a morning with a Samburu tribe seeing their village and learning about their traditions. This was followed by an afternoon at Mount Kenya Animal Orphanage where we got to get up close to some rare and endangered animals.

The following week it was back to work at the hospital. In total we planted about 1000 cabbage and spinach, digging each hole by hand, watering, adding manure and fertiliser and then transplanting the seedlings into the field. The money we all paid to be part of this project went towards the materials. We supplied





the vegetables, fertiliser, bought our own tools and left sprinklers and hosepipes to keep the vegetables watered long after we left

Between working at the hospital farm, we also started work

at the school. Our first activity was a malnutrition assessment of a class of 5 year olds, where we took the weight, height and arm measurements of all the children- this generates a score to tell if they are malnourished. At the school we also helped to extend their garden. By growing their own food it will help to ensure that every child that attends school will at least get one meal a day. We extended the garden and planted potatoes, using mouse and bat manure as our fertiliser. We also planted maize and beans around the edge, not only as a food source but also to protect the potato crop and provide a source of nitrogen. At the school we also helped with the breakfast rush, handed out reading books and other donations, kitted out the football team, replaced the posters in some classrooms and got a chance to spend some time playing and singing with the children.

In the middle of the week, we had the day off to travel out to Olepangi Farm, which is an organic farm and retreat. In the morning we were given a farm tour and shown the goats and jersey cows, the impressive stable for their 9 horses, a vast vegetable, flower and fruit garden, the bee hives, the chicken





shed and the process of how they rot down their manure. In the afternoon we had the opportunity to go horse riding - alongside elephants!

At the end of the week we loaded up the bus with medical supplies, picked up some nurses and a doctor and headed out to the remote and rural Samburu villages to set up a medical outreach. We headed out to local communities to treat kids with jiggers. Jiggers are fleas that live in the soil and in soft furnishings. These get into the children's feet when they don't have shoes. We washed their feet, soaked them in hydrogen peroxide to kill the fleas, and then sealed them with a Vaseline type



gel. Whilst we were out and about we handed out other donations including shoes, clothes and bags of porridge. That evening we had nyama choma, which is a traditional Kenyan meat grill.

Over the weekend we went on another adventure. This time to Ngare Ndare forest, where we walked through the forest to the waterfalls. Here we got to swim and we also saw rhino and leopard prints. For the rest of the weekend, we spent our time at a local youth expo, went to church with our host and went for a walk.

Our final day was spent back at the school, the schools had broken up for the holidays but the hundred poorest children in the school were entitled to a space at holiday club. In the morning we played football and games whilst we prepared their lunch. We made rice and meat, a rare treat for the kids. After we served the kids, some three times over.

we got chance to eat some ourselves and finished our last day off with some swimming.

That is a very brief summary of our two weeks in Kenya, it has been the most incredible and immersive experience and it has been a pleasure to represent NFYFC and Devon YFC whilst being in Kenya. We have learnt so much along the way about Kenya, their farming, the culture and also learning off of my fellow young farmers. We have come home having made a difference to the lives of the young children we have helped and the future patients of Haruma hospital.





## JAMAICA NFYFC TEAM TRAVEL JORDAN WINTER & LUCY TREVARTHEN

yself and fellow Totnes member Lucy Trevarthen were lucky enough to be selected for a National scholarship along with 6 other members from all over the country to Jamaica! The trip was going to be two weeks of volunteering at two different charity establishments.

### Week 1: The Mustard Seed Gift of Hope Foundation.

Mustard Seed is a charity that houses disabled children and adults when their families can no longer manage with their relatives condition. The foundation aims to be as self-sufficient. as possible using their approx.. 5 acres of land to grow vegetables, such as sweet potato and beans. We spent the week in the humid Caribbean sun being put to work with our only tool of a hoe where we assisted the farmer in clearing his ground and planting the crop. We were also able to spend time with the residents and help with feeding and general day to day care. The last volunteers at Mustard were a YFC group, so it was great to carry the work they had started!

### Week 2: Ebenezer Rehabilitation Centre

Ebenezer is another charity run establishment which takes in men that either have mental conditions or have become homeless due to their circumstances and aims to get them back into society.

At Ebenezer they use farming as a form of rehabilitation. The site is approximately 11/12 acres of hilly lush Caribbean forest where they have goats, 3 cows, chickens and an ever expanding vegetable crop. All residents have set tasks on the farm and are given responsibilities to enable them



to have a sense of ownership and daily routine. We helped with day to day tasks and cleared and fertilised (once again with our trustee hoe!) their greenhouse ready for planting. Once work was finished we were allowed time to interact with the residents playing sport and finding out more about their story.

We also visited an award winning goat farm which was ran by an exprofessional British heavy weight boxer! Along with attending Jamaica's national agricultural show.

In our downtime we were treated to language classes, cooking classes and a reggae dance class which were extremely fun and interesting. On the weekends we were taken to some tourist destinations of beaches and waterfalls which were fantastic and a great chance to lap up the Caribbean sun!

Overall it was a fantastic trip that I will never forget. It allowed me to see a country that I never thought I would travel to and got to see the real side of it. I can't thank NFYFC enough for arranging an incredible trip, the whole experience right from application to returning from the trip was so well organised. 
the County finals to come away third, up against some super competition. Zara also came away with second in JMOTY.

On behalf of the club I would like to thank everyone who has supported and helped Honiton YFC this year, however big or small your support was very much appreciated.






e've had a great year with a good amount of members all sticking together. We raised a lot of money at the tar barrel parking - just under £1000!

A massive thanks must go to everyone who has contributed to make 2022/23 such a successful year for Withleigh - long may it continue!






As a short summary, Woolsery have had a cracking comeback year.






